Donor Spotlight: Elsa Vogt

Every once and awhile you meet a bright, charming, confident person who seems to have life's priorities figured out. Eight-year-old Elsa Vogt is one of those people. Elsa might be one of the Foundation's youngest donors, but she certainly understands the importance of philanthropy with a wisdom beyond her years.

We sat down with Elsa and her mom, Confluence Health employee and friend of the Foundation, Casey Vogt, to learn more about her life and why she chooses to donate her hard-earned money to causes she cares about.

Name and age: Elsa Vogt, age 8

School and grade: Elsa will be a 3rd grader at John Newbery Elementary this fall.

Favorite subjects in school: Science and math

What do you want to be when you grow up? Scientist and veterinarian. A passion for helping animals runs in the family. Elsa's great grandfather was a veterinarian and researcher who developed important vaccines, including one that protects pups from canine parvovirus.

Top three favorite things to do in the summertime: Swimming, family vacations, and playing with her new English Cream Golden Retriever puppy, Ginny (short for Ginger Peach).

Do you have any other pets? In addition to her puppy, Ginny, she has two cats, Livy and Lolo. They were belated birthday presents for Elsa. Her mom went to the foster home to choose one, but the two kittens (sisters) refused to be separated. They cried out for each other and created a heartbreaking scene. Casey was swayed by the touching display of feline emotion and decided to adopt the pair. It's no mystery where Elsa gets her compassion for animals.

Elsa and her family also have 17 chickens. In the warmer months, the chickens can lay up to 14 eggs a day. The eggs are beautiful. Each one is unique in color and size. Some eggs are bluish-green, others are brown-speckled, dark-brown, or white. Sometimes the eggs are so big that they don't fit in the egg carton. Other times they are the size of a ping pong ball.

Rather than let the abundance of eggs go to waste, industrious Elsa packages them up for friends, family members, and neighbors and sells them for \$4 a dozen. Elsa keeps \$2 for her hard work and stashes the other \$2 in a jar. When the jar gets full, she donates the money to a local non-profit. This time, she brought her donation to the Confluence Health Foundation.

Why did you choose to donate some of your egg profits? Elsa said she believes that the Foundation is a good place for her donation because, "Others need it more than we do. Helping others is more important than toys." This is the fundamental principle of philanthropy—giving something of value,

whether it is time, money, resources, or talent, for the purposes of helping others in need. Even at the tender age of eight, Elsa understands that she can make a difference in the lives of others through generosity.

With the help of her mom, Elsa chose to split her donation to the Foundation between two causes she cares about. Part of her donation will go to helping patients in need pay for medications, medical supplies, transportation assistance to and from care, and other critical items that patients may not be able to afford on their own. The second part will go to our Snuggle Buddies program. Snuggle Buddies are plush stuffed animals that pediatric patients receive when they are admitted to Confluence Health's Central Campus. They help reduce the stress and uncertainty of their stay, and, best of all, kids can take their new friend home with them.

The Foundation isn't the only local nonprofit Elsa has helped. She's also donated to the Wenatchee Valley



Humane Society. One year, Elsa asked that her friends bring items on the shelter's wish list in lieu of bringing gifts to her birthday party. She then donated the items to help animals living in the shelter.

Do you have any advice for people that are thinking about donating to a cause they care about? "I would say give as much money as they can," Elsa said. "It's really important to make a donation to help anything that is alive that needs help."

For many people, the hardest part of philanthropy isn't a lack of things to give or a cause to care about, it's believing that a donation will make a difference. Elsa knows generosity is powerful and is willing to give what she can to ensure people and pets get a little extra help when they need it most.

We had one last burning question for Elsa:

What is your favorite way to eat eggs? Elsa said, "The best part of raising chickens is having fresh eggs for breakfast!" She loves eating eggs on toast with her grandma's strawberry jam.

10th Anniversary of the Armada Golf Classic: A Tinclad Commitment

Tin is the symbol of a ten-year anniversary.

Admittedly, not all milestones can be as distinguished as gold and diamond anniversaries; 50th and 75th anniversaries, respectively. It's just that tin seems like an underwhelming representation of the value of the Confluence Health Foundation's longstanding partnership with Armada Corp, now in its tenth year.

Since 2014, Armada has been the largest sponsor of Confluence Health Foundation's signature events, the "Spirit of A. Z. Wells" Gala and the Golf Classic. Most notably, in their first year as sponsors, Armada became the title sponsor of the Armada Golf Classic. Since then, Armada's contributions have been a key factor in the growth of the golf tournament resulting in increased charitable revenue generated by the event. Net proceeds from the tournament are used to purchase life-saving and therapeutic equipment as well as fund innovation and improvements that advance local care. A list items funded by Armada Golf Classic proceeds beginning in 2014 is below.

- 2015 **\$51,625** to Exoskeleton Financial Assistance Fund
- 2016 \$65,898 to Masimo Patient SafetyNet System
- 2017 \$74,232 to Sterilization Room at Wenatchee Valley Hospital
- 2018 **\$62,414** to Emergency Preparedness Equipment and Training & Stop the Bleed Training
- 2019 \$66,138 to multiple programs that help go above and beyond for patients
- 2020 \$50,394 (no tournament due to COVID-19) sponsors donated to COVID-19 Response

2021 - **\$69,526** (no tournament due to COVID-19) sponsors donated to Colposcope at Moses Lake Campus and a Blood Culture Incubator at Central Campus

- 2022 \$73,985 Adaptive Bike program
- 2023 Tournament will be held on September 18, 2023

Armada Corp President and Chief Executive Officer, Tim Carson, believes it is important to stand alongside the Confluence Health Foundation. "Our community is fortunate to have access to outstanding healthcare in North Central Washington," Tim said. "It is easy to take that for granted, at times, until we are impacted by personal medical challenges. My own experiences, and those of family members, friends, and employees, have heightened my awareness of the scope and depth of the care available to all of us as well as the needs for additional programs,

equipment, and infrastructure. The Confluence Health Foundation, through its fundraising campaigns and events, has been instrumental in funding many projects throughout the years that, otherwise, would not have been possible. Our entire community benefits from the Foundation's efforts and the generosity of its donors."

Counting this year's commitment to the Armada Golf Classic, Armada Corp will have contributed \$192,000 in sponsorship funding to advance the Foundation's mission of enhancing Confluence Health's ability to provide high quality healthcare close to home. Their support constitutes a major investment in our local healthcare system, which is predicated on the belief that local businesses and individuals can have an outsized impact on their community's healthcare. "Through the years, we have seen the evolution of specialty care, with oncology and the cardiothoracic surgery programs being examples," Tim said. "While it was once necessary to travel to larger health systems for this specialized care, that now is not necessarily the case. My hope is that we build on the successes and continue to advance the delivery of specialized care to the residents North Central Washington."

This summer, Armada committed to an additional three years of support, meaning their legacy of generosity will continue.

According to a quick web search, tin symbolizes the flexibility and stability of a relationship after ten years. Armada's strong commitment to our region's healthcare most definitely embodies these characteristics, but to us, these ten years are golden.
